The period following WW2 represents a social phenomenon. The hardships and rationing following the war ended; there was full employment, and people could afford holidays, they had cars and roads were improving. There was great optimism and also a building boom.

One outlet for this energy was the continuing story of Australia's love affair with the beach. Caloundra, due to its proximity to Brisbane, Ipswich, and Toowoomba, was a key destination for holiday makers. These were the formative years for Moffat Beach, the suburb was predominantly bushland in 1940 but was overflowing with holiday houses 20 years later. Explore Moffat Beach's heritage and architecture in this 1.5 hr walk and talk with local architect and heritage guru Rodger Todd.

Set within 82 hectares of native bushland at Tanawha, the Maroochy Regional Bushland Botanic Garden is a living celebration of the Sunshine Coast's natural heritage, where landscape, art, culture and design come together in a unique expression of place.

Guided by the vision to inspire a deep connection to nature, the garden acknowledges the Kabi Kabi people as the region's First Nations custodians and first curators, whose enduring connection to Country continues to shape how this landscape is cared for and shared.

For homeowners, designers, landscape architects and anyone interested in creating places that belong, the garden offers inspiration for how landscapes can respond to climate, celebrate local character and strengthen regional identity. Through its collection of Sunshine Coast native plants, public art and immersive experiences, visitors can explore how colours, textures, forms and species drawn from the local environment can influence gardens, homes and communities.

The name TM Burke is now linked to large-scale coastal subdivisions in Noosa, but its first development opened at Sunshine Beach in 1929, heralded as Queensland's first garden suburb and the beginning of town planning in the state. This talk traces the full history of TM Burke in Noosa, from the original garden suburb modelled on the company's Melbourne developments, to its final chapter under different ownership, the court battle and street marches to save the Marcus Beach High Dunes from development. It compares early twentieth-century subdivision design with the later plans for Marcus Beach, drawing on a recent interview with a member of the Burke family.

After more than a decade of community advocacy, construction of the University of the Sunshine Coast commenced in 1995 on a carefully selected 100-acre site of former low-lying sugar cane land bordering the Mooloolah River National Park. The vision transformed the site into an award-winning campus recognised nationally for its sustainability, landscape integration and architectural excellence.

The University officially opened in 1996 with approximately 500 students, 48 staff and Professor Paul Thomas as its inaugural Vice-Chancellor. This year, UniSC celebrates its 30th anniversary as a thriving multi-campus university with more than 21,000 students, including around 11,000 at the Sunshine Coast campus, and a workforce of almost 1,300 staff.

- The original campus masterplan by renowned architect Romaldo Giurgola, designer of Australia's Parliament House.
- The architectural vision behind key campus buildings by leading Sunshine Coast architects.

- The emergence of a distinctive Sunshine Coast architectural style.

Step inside a piece of history with an exclusive opportunity to explore the heritage-listed WWII Air Raid Shelter, opened to the public uniquely for this event. This rare access is the centrepiece of a journey through Landsborough's Cribb Street, where the town's rich past meets its newly upgraded contemporary streetscape. Beginning at the site of the former railway refreshment rooms, you will sit under striking new structures designed by Bark Architects and learn how historical references informed their design. As you stroll through the heart of the township, your guide, Alex Gray, will reveal stories of the past woven into modern art and design elements, culminating in the chance to go behind the doors of the wartime shelter.

Built in 1924 by architect Walter Carey Voller, the heritage-listed Landsborough Shire Council Chambers has undergone significant internal work to restore and reveal its history. Guides Hayden Roberts and Alex Gray take visitors through the building and its restoration, from the refreshed 1960s colour scheme to a look inside the old safe.

After the museum, visitors can walk the streets of Landsborough, reading the heritage signs and using the app to hear the stories of the township, formerly Mellum Creek, including how the old hotel was moved on skids by bullock team to its current site with the bar still open and not a bottle broken.

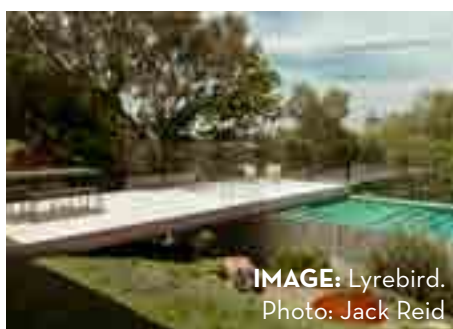

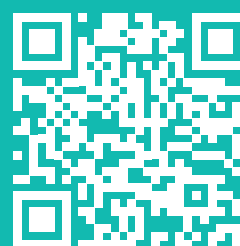

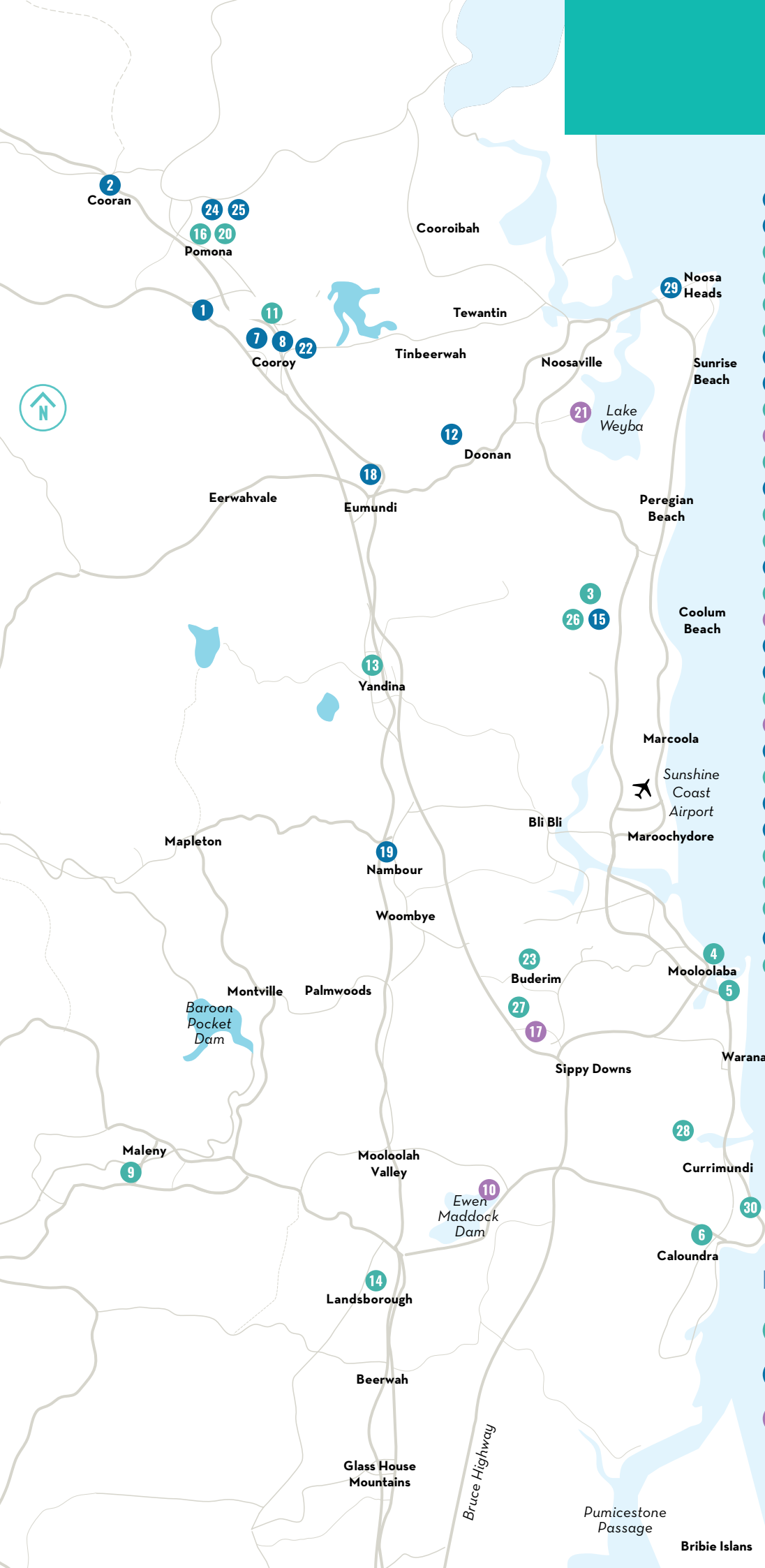

Designed by Matthew Noffke Architects, 62 Tallowwood Place responds to the challenges of adapting a well-built 1990s home for contemporary outdoor living. The original home is a neo-classical colonial reproduction, from an era when the house was designed to tell a story, rather than the open-plan approach common today. Rooms unfolded in a procession. The architects intervened here with a series of architectural pavilions and structures that deliberately contrast with the original home.

The extensions respect the established home, but continue that story outward, adding a new series of contemporary functional rooms and outdoor gathering spaces that carry the narrative into the forested setting beyond. The new structures embrace a reactive postmodernism, picking up and reinterpreting the gestures of the original house, but translated into a language suited to the surrounding bushland. The result is a considered conversation between old and new.

A key feature of the addition is the avant-garde sky lounge, orientated to capture views of sunset and the dark skies to the west of Black Mountain, framing the stars as part of the everyday experience of the home. The structure has also been designed with ecology in mind, built to support Richmond Birdwing Vines, the habitat vines that sustain the larvae of this beautiful, increasingly rare butterfly. Over time, the vines are intended to clamber over the structure itself, so the building becomes not just a shelter for its occupants but a host for the surrounding ecosystem, blurring the line between architecture and landscape as the vines mature and take hold. Taken together, the pavilions form a quiet but confident addition, one that lets the original home keep its own character while giving the family a genuinely new way to live outdoors, in close contact with the forest around them.

The railway arrived at Cooran from Gympie in June 1889, which helped the district to develop as an agricultural and timber centre. Shops were built along King Street opposite the railway line.

Alfredson's joinery, pre-cut house fabrication workshop and sawmill (former), was built and expanded between 1933 and the 1950s. It produced at least 1,200 pre-cut houses by the mid-1960s.

The building is 65 metres long and 13 metres wide over three levels - the former joinery workshop at street level, the former pre-cut house fabrication workshop to the middle and the sawmilling area at the lower level.

The pre-cut house business ceased in the mid 1980's and subsequent owners sold off most of the equipment. The first floor fronting King St has been used for a variety of businesses and is now Noosa Hinterland Brewing Company.

Since 1990 Al Guymer's use of the building for his joinery workshop, and as a base for his building and demolition work, is a fortunate coincidence which maintains a similar use and aesthetic which complements the historic use of the building.

Guymer's large collection of historic woodworking tools and general construction equipment adds another layer of significance.

Andy's House sits on a site with sweeping views across Mt Coolum and the surrounding coastal farmland. Its northeast orientation was deliberately chosen to capture that outlook, working with the site's natural conditions. The project grew out of an established working relationship between the home's owner and builder, Andrew Martin and Jolyon Robinson principal of Robinson Architects. The project was simply referred to as 'Andy's House' during the planning stages in the architects studio, and the name has stuck ever since.

Sustainability runs through the design. A thick rammed earth wall forms the spine of the building, giving the home exceptional thermal mass to help regulate indoor temperatures year-round. Floor-to-ceiling louvres support cross-ventilation, drawing in cooling breezes and reducing reliance on artificial cooling. Rainwater harvesting and an onsite wastewater treatment system further cut the home's ecological footprint and ongoing running costs.

The material palette balances warmth with durability. Inside, spotted gum flooring, plywood ceilings and exposed rammed earth walls give the home an inviting, textured feel that echoes the surrounding landscape. Outside, galvanised corrugated iron cladding nods to traditional Australian rural buildings, chosen for its durability and low maintenance.

Despite a modest footprint, the three-bedroom home feels spacious yet compact thanks to efficient planning. Its open, unconventional linear layout is bookended by bedrooms, adults one end kids the other with living in-between. Mt Coolum and the distant Pacific Ocean remain a constant presence throughout the house, keeping its occupants closely connected to the landscape and beyond.

Avani Mooloolaba Beach Hotel sits on Brisbane Road, close to the beach and the heart of Mooloolaba's dining and shopping strip. The 12-storey hotel brings a contemporary, laid-back approach to coastal hospitality, with sweeping glass façades and a curved form that echoes the movement of water along the foreshore. Interiors by Studio Raso draw on warm timber, travertine stone and tactile textiles, grounding the building in the natural tones of the region.

The hotel will soon open First Ave Cellar + Bar, its newest addition to the dining and drinks offering, designed to complement the hotel's broader hospitality strategy and give guests and locals another reason to spend time on site.

Take a tour that goes beyond the guest-facing areas, through the hotel's back-of-house spaces, for a look at the planning and infrastructure that keeps a hotel of this scale running smoothly. It's an opportunity to see the operational side that sits behind the polished finish most guests never encounter.

The tour also stops at First Ave Cellar + Bar before finishing on the terrace. Suited to anyone with an interest in architecture, hospitality design, or how large-scale coastal developments are planned and operated, this is a rare chance to see a major hotel from the inside out.

Bombala is a house designed by Sealand Architects for a retired couple to enjoy a relaxed lifestyle and entertain friends and family, with a brief centred on the property's water views and the subtropical climate.

The design responds to three challenges. The first was opening the house to the outdoors while still protecting it from summer sun, rain and wind, resolved through large sliding glass doors and windows, overhanging roofs, timber vertical screens, and two covered decks, one to the north and one to the south, letting the owners move around the house to follow the sun or escape the wind through the day.

The second was designing for the clients to stay in the home as their mobility changes with age, so the ground level, including the garage, living areas and

a second main bedroom, is entirely step-free and wheelchair accessible, with an upper-level suite able to accommodate a carer or relative in future. The third was a dramatic double-height living space with genuinely good acoustics, achieved with a timber batten ceiling concealing acoustic panels.

A masterclass in designing for site conditions, this building was awarded the Gabriel Poole Award for Building of the Year at the 2024 Sunshine Coast Regional Architecture Awards.

Caloundra's twin lighthouses chart Queensland's maritime history. The 1896 timber-and-iron lighthouse, relocated then restored, is the town's oldest building. Beside it, the 1968 concrete Signal Station reflects changing technology. Together they offer sweeping views and a vivid story of coastal navigation.

The Caloundra Lighthouses mark the entry to the North West Channel, the main shipping route into Brisbane.

The 1896 lighthouse was constructed with a timber frame and corrugated iron cladding, a construction type unique to Queensland lighthouses. In 1968 it was replaced by the Signal Station, Light and Radar Installation, a reinforced concrete structure. The two sat side by side until 1970 when the 1896 lighthouse was relocated to Golden Beach. It remained there for 29 years. After the Signal Station was decommissioned due to changing technology, the 1896 lighthouse was restored to its original position. It is Caloundra's oldest building.

There are spectacular views to the shipping channel, Moreton Island and the Glass House Mountains. Caloundra's European history is closely linked to the story of the lighthouses, and the two buildings provide evidence of the history of lighthouses from both ends of the time scale.





University of the Sunshine Coast - Celebrating 30 Years

When UniSC opened its first campus on the Sunshine Coast in 1996, it was just a small university college with a big dream: to create educational and growth opportunities for the region and beyond.

In 1997, the library opened to great acclaim, winning the prestigious Sir Zelman Cowen Award for the best public building in Australia. Ditching traditional, closed-in library designs, its sweeping roof skillions, grand Queensland verandah, and trailblazing passive light and ventilation lets the outside in. It was designed by John Mainwaring and Associates (in association with Lawrence Nield and Partners).

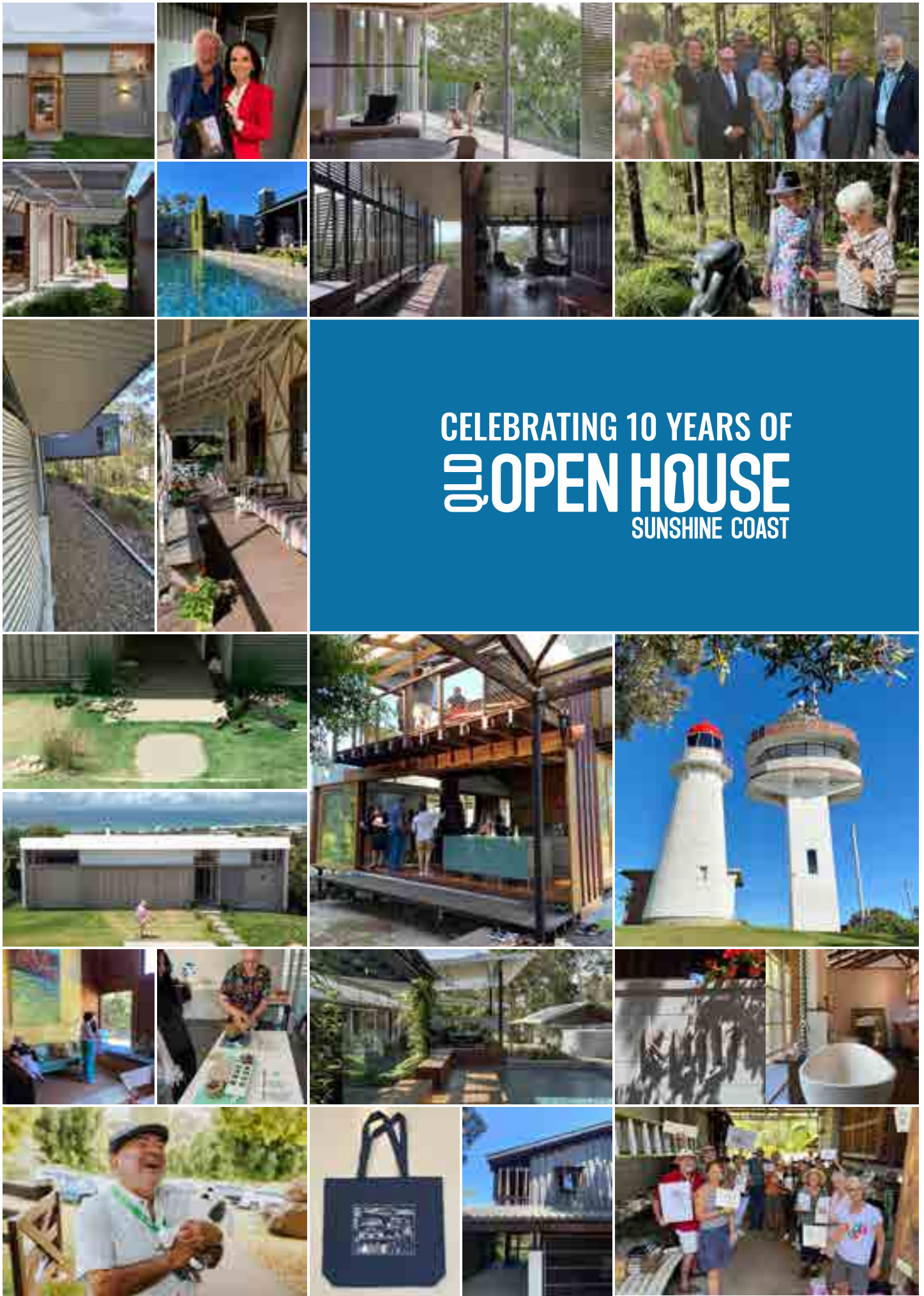
Fusing art, ideas and community. UniSC purchased its first artwork in 1995 and grew the collection to over 1000 works - the largest public collection of art in the Sunshine Coast region. It's displayed in the stunning art gallery, which opened in 2004 and was later redeveloped in 2020.

In 2019 UniSC became the first university in Australia to install a water battery powered by the sun to help cool the Sunshine Coast campus, with partners Veolia. In its first year, it saved more than 4,232 tonnes of carbon dioxide emissions - believed to be the equivalent of planting almost 70,000 trees and growing them for 10 years. It wins an Out of the Box award at the Global District Energy Climate Awards.

Fast forward to today, and UniSC has grown into a vibrant hub of world-class learning, research and innovation, recognised as a global leader in sustainability.

UniSC have educated more than 42,000 graduates and delivered research and learning that has helped create healthier people and a healthier planet. They have invested more than \$700 million in infrastructure across the communities they serve, with five campuses from Moreton Bay to Fraser Coast, and interstate in Adelaide.

The Cooroy House is a modest, off-grid home immersed within its landscape. Taking cues from the surrounding timber and tin cottages of the area, the lightweight, single-story structure is simple and cost-effective. Raised above the ground on a single platform, it imposes minimal disruption to the sensitive site.

The house is composed of a series of pavilions and courtyard gardens stitched together by a linear verandah spine. This external space acts as the main circulation route, providing its occupants with a constant connection to the landscape. The main courtyard is framed by the building on one side and the sloping hillside on the other, offering a protected retreat embedded within the expansive site.

The building is positioned along the contours of the hill and oriented to the northeast to capture warming winter sun into the L-shaped plan. Operable screens and planting provide protection from the harsher summer weather.

Built in 1956, the Cooroy Lower Mill Site Kilns are the only surviving example of a timber-drying complex of a design once common throughout South East Queensland during the post-war timber industry boom. This heritage-listed site includes the original boiler, steam engine, generator, control room, hopper and timber drying kilns, with many of the original belt drives and ventilation fans still intact. Today, the kilns have been repurposed as the workshop of the Cooroora Woodworkers Club. The tour includes both the heritage precinct and the active workshop, so closed-in footwear is required for all visitors.

Located on the traditional lands of the Kabi Kabi and Jinibara peoples, Donnington Ridge is an off-grid cabin in the Sunshine Coast hinterland exploring restraint, resourcefulness and living with less.

An existing structure, no larger than a double garage, has been transformed into sleeping quarters for a family of four. New openings frame the landscape, while charred timber, plywood linings and reclaimed materials elevate a utilitarian building into a warm retreat.

The family escape of architect Rebecca Caldwell of Maytree Studios, the cabin sits within 16 acres of koala-protected bushland. It is not a finished project, but an ongoing exercise in placemaking

and a lifetime commitment to caring for the site: removing weeds, nurturing habitat and creating spaces for others to slow down and reconnect – a campfire, an outdoor bath, a book, wine in the sun and uninterrupted time together.

Solar power, rainwater harvesting, passive design and sustainably sourced materials support a light footprint. Somewhere between camping and a conventional home, Donnington Ridge reflects ideas central to Maytree Studios: using fewer resources to achieve more, finding the floor area that is just right, and creating spaces that feel calm, grounded and deeply connected to place.

Join Seqwater for a behind-the-scenes look at Ewen Maddock Dam and Water Treatment Plant. Built in two stages (1976 and 1983) across Addlington Creek, the dam supplies drinking water to South East Queensland and holds up to 16,587 million litres when full. Tours run alongside access to Maddock Park and the newly upgraded Tallowood Walking Trail.

On 19 November 1976, Ewen Maddock Dam was the official water supply for Caloundra, with the opening led by then Deputy Premier of Queensland, William Knox.

Today, Ewen Maddock Dam plays a role in South East Queensland's drinking water supply. When it's full, it can hold a massive 16,587 million litres of water—that's enough to fill over 6,600 Olympic swimming pools!

It's an un-gated dam, which means when it reaches full capacity, water gently flows over the spillway and out of the dam naturally. It's also located right next to

the Ewen Maddock Water Treatment Plant, making it a vital part of the region's water infrastructure.

The dam wall itself stretches 660 metres – that's about the same as lining up 41 of the iconic Big Pineapples end-to-end. The dam's catchment area spans 21 square kilometres, collecting rainwater from the surrounding landscape.

Seqwater is the one of the few bulk water providers in Australia that manages open catchments, which means locals and visitors can enjoy recreational activities on the very lakes and dams that help supply our drinking water.

Maddock Park, just off Mooloolah Connection Road, is a great spot to relax or get active – whether you're firing up the free BBQs for a picnic, taking a dip in the designated swimming area, exploring the multi-use trails on foot, bike or horseback, or watching the kids enjoy the playground, there's something for everyone to enjoy.

The Hinterland Adventure Playground in Cooroy is an all-abilities, nature-based playground designed by Robinson Architects, with Urbis as landscape architect, for Noosa Shire Council. Built on the site of Cooroy's historic timber mill, the design draws on the region's agricultural and manufacturing history and creates a physical and metaphorical link between Cooroy's main street and the historic lower mill precinct.

The project has been widely recognised, winning the 2026 Australian Institute of Architects Sunshine Coast Regional Project of the Year, as well as Excellence for Play Spaces and Regional Achievement at the 2023 AILA State Awards.

The architecture integrates custom play structures, including a 10-metre play tower and an inclusive double flying fox, within the natural contours of the landscape, balancing built form with the surrounding hinterland environment. The playground itself is made up of a series of play zones ranging from quiet, low-activity spaces to highly active adventure areas.

More than a playground, the site is a community gathering place, with shaded picnic areas, public barbecues, and seating that connects visitors to the surrounding hinterland landscape and encourages exploration, inclusion, and connection to nature.

Kite House is described as a home that appears to have landed among the gum trees, its white, grey and black form camouflaging it within the treetops, with a single orange “iris” marking the entrance. Nestled into a single contour line on a steep, ecologically sensitive site, the three-bedroom home is oriented east-west for solar control, with open living spaces and cocooned, private sleeping quarters.

Perched on the steep contours of the hillside, its long, outstretched wings—rendered in white, grey, and black—mimic the plumage of its namesake, camouflaging the structure within the treetops. Only a single orange “iris” stands out, offering a warm welcome to visitors.

This modest three-bedroom home is a considered response to an ecologically sensitive site. It nestles into a single contour line that wraps around the slope, minimizing its impact on the land. Oriented along an east-west axis, the house is designed for optimal solar control and thermal performance, well-suited to its subtropical environment.

Living spaces dissolve the boundary between inside and out, embracing the landscape, while the private sleeping quarters feel cocooned and serene, with framed views of the lush surrounding flora.”

Looking back, Kite House feels less like a single project and more like the natural conclusion of a journey. Years of renovating and restoring older homes quietly shaped our appreciation for thoughtful design, craftsmanship and the way a home can influence how you feel. With every renovation, we were refining our own ideas about light, space, materials and the kind of life we wanted to create.

So, when it came time to build our own home, we weren't starting with a blank page—we were drawing on years of lived experience. Finding the right site was just as important as the design itself. We were

fortunate to discover a wonderful bush block that offered the privacy we wanted but remained close to the coast. Rather than asking the landscape to accommodate the house, our brief to Scott Bartleet, our marvellous architect, was to position the home to work with the land, minimising clearing and allowing the existing bush to remain the defining feature.

From there working collaboratively with Scott became a true collaboration founded on trust, curiosity and a shared vision. The result is a home that feels deeply personal: beautifully crafted, tranquil and connected to its landscape.

It is not simply the culmination of years of renovating, but learning to listen – to buildings, to places and to the landscape itself. More than anything, Kite House reflects the quiet belief that good design has the power to enrich everyday life.

Step back in time at Koongalba, a beautifully preserved late 19th-century Queensland home built in 1894 by William Andrew Grigor for John and Louisa Low. Reflecting the resourcefulness and craftsmanship of the era, John Low sourced timber locally, floating it down the Maroochy River to William Pettigrew's sawmill before transporting it back to the site by bullock wagon. Doors, windows, and fittings were ordered from Pettigrew's Brisbane catalogue, and detailed records reveal Grigor's total payment of just £23.4.8 for the entire build.

The home's design is classic for its time: single-skin walls with cross bracing, four central rooms surrounded by wide verandahs, and an open walkway leading to a separate kitchen and store. Early photographs show decorative acroteria, lending the house a subtle pagoda-like elegance.

Set on land selected by James Low in 1868, Koongalba is surrounded by mature bunya pines, camphor laurels, and mango trees planted by the family. John and Louisa's legacy continued through their nine children, including David Low, MP for Cooroora and chairman of Maroochy Shire Council, marking three generations of public service.

In 1970, Jim and Audienne Blyth, descendants of the Low family, purchased Koongalba and have dedicated themselves to preserving its history, ensuring this architectural and cultural treasure endures for future generations.

Explore a piece of Sunshine Coast history where craftsmanship, family, and community come together in one remarkable heritage home.

In 1924, renowned architect, Walter Carey Voller, designed and built the Landsborough Shire Council Chambers. It is a modest, low-set, hip-roofed, rectangular building constructed from local timbers supplied by A.E. Round. Chamferboards were used in the building and west extension. Much of the original chambers remains unaltered including the lining, picture rail and battened ceiling.

The original shire chambers now forms a significant part of the Landsborough Museum. The building was acquired by the Landsborough & District Historical Society in 1976.

In 1988 the old Council shed was renovated and this extension was clad in rammedearth. Following these major changes, the Landsborough Museum was reopened on Australia Day in 1988 by J.L. Beausang, the last chairman of Landsborough Shire and first mayor of Caloundra City.

The building became state heritage listed in 1999 due to its significance associated with the architect, contribution to the streetscape and the development of local government in the region.

Within the museum, the history of local government administration of the original Landsborough Shire Council is preserved. Photos, memorabilia, artefacts, equipment, and everyday items offer an insight into early settlement and regional development.

Landsborough Museum WALK and FILM

After your visit to the museum, enjoy a walk around Landsborough. Read the heritage signs and download the app to hear the fascinating stories of Landsborough township, formally Mellum Creek. You will find out how the old hotel was pulled on skids by bullock teams to its current location with the bar still open and not a bottle broken. This walk brings the old town to life.

The Majestic theatre is one of the few pre-World War II picture theatres remaining in Queensland that have not been demolished or adapted to other uses. It is also Australia's longest continuously operating picture theatre and the world's longest continuously operating silent film theatre.

The Majestic Theatre was originally built as a social hall with attached shops in 1921. Despite the building being extensively restored and refurbished in 2006, the timber and fibrous cement sheeted building is still a rare, and functional, example of a pre-World War II country hall that was converted into a picture theatre.

The hall was designed to serve several functions: to show silent movies, for vaudeville productions, and to act as a social centre for the town. Over time it served as a venue for dances, balls, concerts,

and wedding functions, roller skating, boxing, and church services. Constructed of unseasoned milled hardwood, the hall was about 12 metres wide by 18 metres long, with seating for 198 people. It included a sprung dance floor of one-inch crow's ash timber, still extant today, and was raised on stumps to avoid flooding. In the mid 1920s a supper room was added to the long southeast elevation of the hall, and this section was later extended to the northeast.

The enduring appeal of the theatre building lies in its unique and traditional furnishings and fixtures. The Majestic Theatre is home to a 1937 Compton Organ which has recently enjoyed a six-year restoration. The organ, one of only four organs of its kind in the country, features over 750 bellowing pipes.

Every remarkable place begins with a dream. Add passion, vision and thoughtful design, and that dream becomes something truly extraordinary.

For the owners of Eumundi House, leaving Sydney meant finding somewhere very special. The search took years before they discovered an old, sprawling dairy farm beneath the magnificent Mount Cooroy—a place where they could create not just a home, but a way of life.

Their vision was simple yet ambitious: to live in harmony with nature.

“Cohabitation with the horses was a driving force behind building our home here. The herd regularly gathers on the verandah waiting for us. It remains a great joy.”

Designed by Peter Ireland of AJC, the property comprises a house, garage and horse pavilion that sit gently within the landscape. Rather than separating people and animals with fences, the buildings embrace the rural setting, allowing horses, wildlife and people to share the same environment. The result is an award-winning home that celebrates connection rather than separation.

What began as the idea of a simple farm shed gradually evolved into a sanctuary where architecture, landscape and nature exist in balance. It was never intended to be a fortress, but a place where people, animals and the environment could live together, interact and flourish.

The home welcomes the outdoors in. The mountain, the creek, the changing sky, the moon and the stars all become part of everyday life, blurring the boundaries between inside and outside.

Over the years, Eumundi House has become far more than an architectural achievement. It has evolved into a living landscape. The gardens have grown naturally, beauty emerging when nature is allowed to thrive rather than be controlled. The

horse herd has grown to thirteen, all living freely within their sanctuary.

Visitors will also discover one of Australia's most significant private sculpture parks. The collection ranges from the powerful works of Inge King to the joyful creations of Gillie & Marc, a variety of works by renowned marble sculptor Graham Radcliffe alongside work by international artists and striking sculptures from local basalt. The gardens, artworks and landscape create an experience that is inspiring and deeply connected to place.

On 25 October, visitors will enjoy the rare privilege of exploring this remarkable property, which is not normally open to the public. It is a unique opportunity to see how vision, passion and exceptional design transformed a former dairy farm into a thriving sanctuary.

Eumundi House shows that a house becomes a true home only when architecture works in harmony with its surroundings. The absence of fences encourages wildlife and horses to move freely across the landscape, supporting habitat regeneration and biodiversity. A vision not as creating wilderness, but as creating a place for wildness.

The day will also explore the important theme of rewilding, with Lynn Scott sharing her insights into restoring natural systems and explaining her innovative energy mapping approach.

The home has been carefully planned to support ageing in place, with accessibility, appropriate lighting for ageing eyes, energy efficiency and passive environmental design all considered.

Eumundi House and Moon Mountain Sanctuary is ultimately a celebration of what happens when passion, vision, nature and good design come together—a place where architecture enriches not only the owners' lives, but also the landscape and wildlife that surround it.

The Nambour Tram Terminus building forms an integral part of a 10-year project to reactivate the heritage listed Tramway that runs through the Nambour CBD. In the near future, the Terminus will house a unique Tram which will run along the old Cane Tramway, through the centre of town, and eventually into the Nambour Show Grounds, giving the town great opportunities to capitalise on a piece of moving street art.

The building's design has taken inspiration from the old Moreton Mill, with its tropical rooflines, the use of traditional corrugated iron, and merging gables. Architect, Trevor Smith, from Greenway Architects, has captured the essence of Nambour's past in a contemporary building that has, since its opening, become a pivotal hub for the community. The design not only offers a meeting place, but also a visitor information centre, sited within a few steps of both

bus and rail drop-offs. It also houses office space for a Town Project Officer.

The Tram, that is currently under construction, will be housed on-site and will be unique to Nambour. It will feature a futuristic "Steam Punk" design, run on heritage 2" track, and draw its power from the 92 x 350 kw solar panels located on the Terminus roof. It will not use batteries to store its energy, but rather, embrace the emerging technology of super capacitors.

Noosa Museum was founded by the Cooroora Historical Society in 1985 as a means to preserve the vanishing remnants of our past, and to make our history accessible by residents and visitors. The museum officially opened on 27th April 1985 in the building that was previously the Noosa Shire Council Chambers.

Noosa Museum's collection includes over 5,000 artefacts telling the story of our region, from the early days to recent times. They include farming equipment, carpentry tools, timber samples - Pomona was known for its high quality timber - through to war relics and musical instruments.

Each display illustrates a moment in time and traces the progress of the Noosa district, from before the arrival of the first Europeans through to the present day. It is a fascinating journey through time.

There is also a library of books about the Noosa Shire and newspapers dating back to the early 20th century and an extensive collection of photographs capturing many moments of our pioneering past, as well as modern moments that will one day be part of local history. These historical photographs offer a revealing insight into the life and times of the

district, from the years before the establishment of Noosa Shire in 1910, through to recent times. The pictures document the transformation of the region from an untouched landscape that was home to the indigenous people, through the days of the pioneer settlers to the tourism and development powerhouse it is today.

Visitors are welcome to look through the library, photographs and historical records.

Noosa Museum is more than a static display. They appear at various events throughout the district, where they might be found demonstrating heritage machinery - perhaps even our fire engines - giving presentations on subjects of interest, selling our publications, even hosting performers.

Noosa Shire Museum acknowledge the Gubbi Gubbi people, traditional owners of the land on which this museum is sited, and we pay our respects to elders past, present and emerging.

The Permaculture Noosa Community Pavilion (also known as the Bendigo Bank Community Pavilion) at the Cooroy Community Gardens is a vibrant example of sustainable, inclusive, community-led design. Designed collaboratively with Ecolibrium from 2020 and completed in stages through to 2023, the pavilion represents a shared vision for connection, education, wellbeing, and environmental stewardship, shaped by volunteers, local organisations, grant funding partners, and the wider community.

A standout feature of the project was its hands-on natural building workshops, where participants learned traditional cob-building techniques and helped construct the pavilion's cob walls, turning the build itself into a capacity-building and skills-sharing exercise.

Today, the pavilion is a welcoming community hub for workshops, shared meals, harvest swaps, sustainability education, gardening activities, cultural events, and community connection, supporting social inclusion across ages, backgrounds, and abilities. The project strongly aligns with the 2026 Sunshine Coast Open House theme of Sustainable

Inclusive Design through its use of natural materials, regenerative design principles, and focus on social wellbeing and environmental responsibility.

Pioneer Cottage Buderim is an example of early settlement of Buderim as an agricultural area, based originally on the cultivation and processing of sugar cane. It is one of the oldest surviving residences in Buderim, remains substantially intact, and demonstrates the characteristics of an early 1880's farmhouse built of local timbers no longer generally available. The cottage was gifted to the Buderim community in 1965 and there has been substantial community effort in restoring and maintaining the cottage in good condition.

The cottage was erected for Buderim settlers John Kerle Burnett, his wife Ann North and their family by Harry Board, on 20 acres selected in 1878 for £15. Constructed of pit sawn timber it functions as a house museum and headquarters of the Buderim Historical Society.

Local timbers were used to construct the house - tallowwood (*Eucalyptus microcorys*) for floor bearers, white beech (*Gmelina leichhardtii*) for floors, walls and ceilings, and red cedar (*Toona ciliata*) for doors and joinery. The timber was felled from the property or nearby and pit sawn. The core of the building initially comprised a central hallway and four rooms - front parlour, front bedroom, rear dining room and rear bedroom. The stairs and upstairs bedrooms were added as the family grew.

The original shingle roof was replaced between 1907 and 1909 with corrugated iron, and the rear verandah was enclosed in the 1920s. The original kitchen and oven were behind the main building.

Pomona House builds thoughtfully within the Sunshine Coast hinterland, oriented to hinterland views along a ridgeline, set back from the street. Passive design runs throughout: the home opens on both sides at its heart for natural cross-ventilation, easing reliance on mechanical cooling. A glazed corridor breaks the built form at the master suite, keeping the landscape present throughout.

Pomona House: A Home Made for the Land

Some places tell you what they want to be. This one did.

After decades in Sydney, Becky and Steve were ready for something slower. Semi-retirement, they'd decided, should feel easy: unhurried mornings, room to breathe, a life shaped by the land rather than the calendar. The search led them to a block in the Noosa Hinterland, and the moment they stood on it, they knew.

It's hard to explain what the site holds. A stillness, privacy, and long views rolling out across the hinterland. Nothing dramatic, just a quietness that's

easier to feel than describe. Becky and Steve felt it instantly. Whatever house came next, it couldn't compete with that feeling. It had to protect it.

So the house doesn't announce itself. It settles into the ridgeline, low and linear, following the land rather than arguing with it. At its centre sits one generous living space, open on both sides, landscape to the north, garden to the south — so that inside and outside blur into a single experience. You don't walk out to the garden. It's already there with you. Above, a pitched ceiling gives the room air and lift. Timber lines the ceiling and walls, warm and unpolished, more akin to bark and stone than plaster and paint. Outside, the palette stays just as honest: timber stained black, polished concrete, and stone. Materials that aim to be nothing other than what they are.

Walk the length of the house and the story keeps unfolding. The bedrooms stretch to one end, the master retreat to the other. Between them, a glass-walled passage interrupts the form, offering a brief, immersive connection to the view as you pass through. Small gesture, big effect: even here, the land is never far away.

Pomona Railway Station opened in 1891 with completion of the line from Cooran to Cooroy. The station closed 100 years later in 1991. Its disused buildings fell into dilapidation, and their future seemed uncertain. In 1997 the Pomona Chamber of Commerce asked Queensland Rail to donate the buildings to the community. Queensland Rail agreed on the proviso the buildings were moved. Following negotiation with Council and the efforts of many volunteers, the buildings were moved to Council land in April 2000.

The Federation-funded Pomona Railway Station Gallery opened in March 2001. Since opening, the

gallery has grown to offer retail and several unique exhibition spaces for both emerging and established artists and craftspeople, as well as facilitate creative workshops and events. In the past 12 months the gallery has facilitated and supported 34 exhibitions.

The gallery consists of several buildings of historical value including an Information Room, Signal Room, Station Master Room, Banana Shed, Carriage Exhibition Room and Blacksmith Shed for resident artists.

It is a community run space, managed and staffed entirely by volunteers.

Sanctuary Church is a landmark community project on a 55,650m² site in the Sunshine Coast hinterland, reimagining what a contemporary place of worship can be as a destination for spiritual connection, community gathering and lifelong learning.

At its heart is a 790-seat auditorium for worship and large-scale events, supported by an administration wing and a children's ministry wing, designed to foster inclusivity and community spirit. The building responds to the subtropical climate through passive design, including cross-ventilation, deep verandas and orientation to prevailing breezes, for long-term comfort and a strong connection to place.

A steeply sloped site became a guiding design opportunity rather than a constraint. The building is recessed into the landscape for an intimate, grounded presence, with accessible entry, generous parking and electric buggy shelters for peak times. Inside, a café opens to a custom-designed children's play area. The scale is monumental yet warm, with soaring ceilings and flexible multipurpose zones. The project is the result of close collaboration with church leadership and Arc Assembly, who brought richness and warmth to the interiors.

Pastor Ashley Good says every decision, from the timber and sandstone to the placement of an olive tree symbolising resilience and community, was made with deep respect for the site, adding: "I am incredibly proud of what we've accomplished together."

St Clair is a recently completed multi-residential development located on the edge of Lake Kawana in Birtinya. The project comprises two eight-storey apartment buildings containing 200 apartments, predominantly three-bedroom, two-bathroom homes designed for permanent living.

All of the parking requirements for residents and their guests are concealed within two levels of basement parking, supporting extensive communal recreational facilities at ground level, including a 25m lap pool, picnic lawns, BBQ shelters, fire pit and games room. A rooftop terrace on the southern tower provides residents with expansive views across the coastline and hinterland.

Developed and built by Habitat Development Group, St Clair represents the company's first major development outside Sippy Downs and Maroochydore, and its first project to be included in the Sunshine Coast Open House program.

A defining feature of the architecture is the relationship between the two towers, which combine curved forms with an asymmetrical yet complementary composition. Vertical slices through the centre of each building align with the lift lobbies and incorporate floor-to-ceiling glazing, allowing natural light into the core of the buildings while providing residents with an eastern outlook from every level.

A considered palette of natural stone, off-form concrete, cobbles and Venetian-rendered feature walls gives the buildings a refined and distinctive character. The generous scale of the communal spaces and recreational facilities is also notable, providing an exceptional level of amenity for a development of this type.

Together with the rooftop terrace and extensive landscaping, these elements create a strong sense of community and contribute a distinctive piece of architecture to the rapidly emerging Birtinya neighbourhood.

Tucked into an elevated site in the heart of Noosa Heads, The Surf Shack offers a glimpse of a more modest era of coastal living. This simple low-set log cabin sits lightly within its leafy setting, with a relaxed scale and informal relationship to the landscape that contrasts with the larger contemporary residences now reshaping the neighbourhood. Its interest lies in its simplicity and in what it reveals about the evolution of Noosa's residential architecture—from small, climate-responsive coastal homes to today's increasingly intensive development. A chance to experience an understated piece of Noosa's residential story before its next chapter begins.

Take a guided tour of Wilson Beach House with leading local architect Roger Todd. Designed in 1969 by architect John Railton, Wilson Beach House is a rare intact example of a Queensland regional Modernism residence. Built as a holiday home this modest timber “robust box” contained “all the requirements including the car in a large open interior space” balances simplicity, ventilation

and double-height spaces. The simple, economic, traditional construction methods define the essence of Railton’s architecture and embody Sunshine Coast coastal architecture.
